

## **Looking ahead: Landscape**

### Views and planting

Extensive research has been carried out by our landscape architects, Gustafson Porter and Bowman, to understand the special magic of Highgate Cemetery. They have studied countless historical images and documents to rediscover its original layout and likely planting scheme. They have seen how trees and shrubs were used to frame views both of the architectural elements within the Cemetery and outwards to the metropolis. They have thought about how visitors moved through the Cemetery and where they might have rested.

They have considered how the character of the landscape has changed, appreciating the present less manicured state which many people value today.

### **WE WILL**

- Frame internal and external views to 'eye-catcher' monuments and follies
- Re-open and create external views from areas of high ground in both sides of the Cemetery
- Maintain the distinct characters of the East and West sides
- Maintain and reinstate historic structural planting
- Maintain and reopen key views



New trees will need an area about 1.8m x 2m, roughly the size of two graves, to have enough room to grow.

They will be planted in tree pits which have been specially detailed to maintain

soil stability and to ensure that nearby monuments are protected. Tree pits will normally be set at least two rows of graves back from the primary paths.




## **Looking ahead: Landscape**

### **Ecology and habitats**

New openings in the tree cover will admit sunlight, reveal views and monuments, encourage a broad range of flora to create diverse habitats. ■

### **WE WILL**

accentuate the site's topography by separating it into three major territories:

- Wet woodland at the bottom of the hill where water naturally gathers behind the boundary wall
- Broadleaved woodland in the bottom half and at the top of the hill
- Yew woodland at the top left corner of the sites

### **Access and movement**

A safer and improved public realm with level access from Swain's Lane will make visiting more inclusive. Reinstating the original surface levels will allow the Courtyard to become accessible to all. Historically appropriate improvements will be made to the network of path surfaces across the site, making them more suitable for less mobile users.

### **WE WILL**

- Open the West Carriage Drive to the public as it offers a much gentler slope than the other primary paths in the West
- Improve the surface deviation and quality of many path surfaces, making them more suitable for less mobile users
- Provide more regular resting points throughout the Cemetery



## **Sustainability**

### Taking the long term view

We have considered both environmental and socio-economic aspects of sustainability. Environmental sustainability targets have informed the design of the buildings and landscape, while a socio-economic study and ongoing community engagement is informing the Trust's approach to supporting the local community.

Conservation of historic structures will ensure they can be enjoyed by future generations. ■

### **WE WILL**

- Improve drainage to reduce water-logging by repairing where possible existing drainage infrastructure
- Add new sustainable drainage systems, such as below ground attenuation, French drains and soakaways
- Harvest rainwater on new buildings and within the landscape, helping to reduce our use of potable mains water
- Avoid using chemicals in landscape maintenance





# **Looking ahead: Architecture**

### New buildings and re-use of existing buildings

The Dissenters' Chapel will be extensively refurbished, becoming once again a space for the public. New buildings will cater for the Cemetery's current and future needs, providing much needed accommodation for visitors, staff, volunteers and the local community. They have been designed to respect their context. Scale, massing and materials will be sympathetic to the existing historic structures, but in a language of their own time.



The Visitor and Operations building is a new building south of the Colonnade. Ticket office, disabled WC and café face the Chapels across the Courtyard; offices for staff and volunteers continue up West Carriage Drive. This building is carefully designed to complement the historic architecture of the adjacent Colonnade.

### 2. DISSENTERS' CHAPEL

Refurbished for interpretation and exhibitions, it will also be used as a breakout space for the Anglican Chapel enabling for example, catered gatherings after funerals. Offices move out; historical collections remain in the space over the entrance.




### **WE WILL**

- Provide better facilities for visitors, including a café and toilets
- Replace gardeners' store and messroom
- Expand volunteer facilities
- · Provide adequate office space
- Reopen the Dissenters' Chapel, currently in use as office space, making it publicly accessible as an exhibition and interpretation space.



### 3. EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY BUILDING

Set over two storeys, and connecting visually to the historic tunnel entrance, the new building for visitors will create spaces for the Trust's Education & Public Programmes and for use by community groups. There will be out-of hours access directly from Swain's Lane.



### 4. GARDENERS' BUILDING

A new building, recalling traditional English garden walls and built as a retaining structure to the Mound embankment, will consolidate and improve Gardeners' welfare facilities and equipment storage. There will be facilities for grave owners at the upper level as well as a series of memorialisation plaques along the east elevation.




